

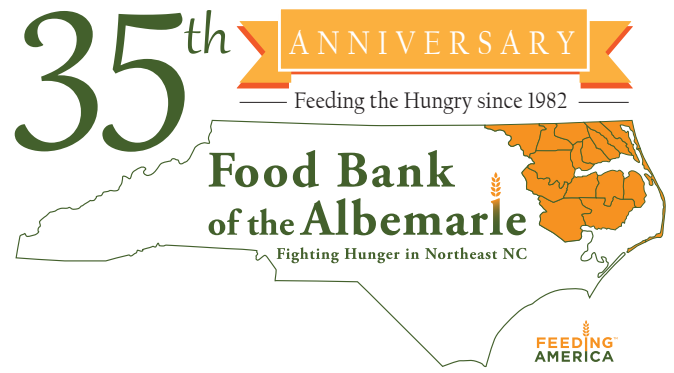

Food insecurity is an increasing problem in the 15 counties served by the Food Bank of the Albemarle. In our service area, 58,040 individuals are unable to consistently access enough nutritious food to live a healthy, active life or went hungry because they had to skip meals.

Because hunger has grown into an epidemic, it is more prevalent than ever and affecting more than just the families living at or below the poverty line. Food insecurity has now emerged as a defined reality for hundreds of thousands of hard-working Americans who still cannot keep food on the table.

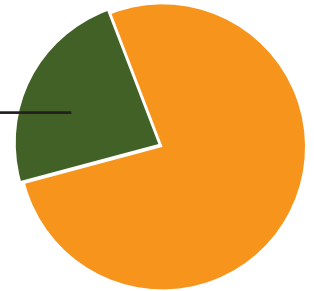

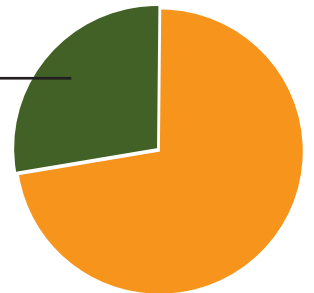

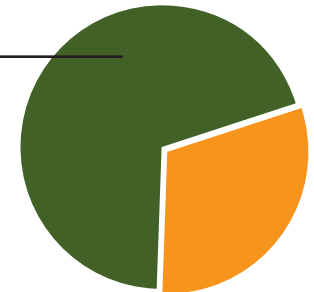

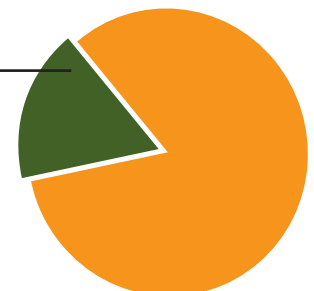
