

From the Executive Director's Desk

Dear Supporters,

The Board of Directors, staff, and volunteers, along with our Hunger Relief Partners, worked diligently to address the needs of the hungry this past year.

Reflecting back on our activities and accomplishments is always worthwhile because it gives us a chance to communicate the organization's performance from the previous year with our supporters. In this report you will see specific details showing our program accomplishments, specifically for programs that provide food to seniors, children, the disabled and the working poor.

I wish I could tell you that things were getting better and the demand for food was decreasing; unfortunately, I can't. With reductions to long term jobless benefits and across the board cuts to food stamps over the last five months, we have seen requests for help increase. In northeast North Carolina one in five, or 20% of the population, lives at or below the poverty level.

We see the face of hunger in our schools, colleges and universities, senior living centers and neighborhoods where you would never expect it to exist. But exist it does. Nevertheless, the Food Bank of the Albemarle is committed to finding new and innovative ways to aid those who struggle with hunger.

Our hope is that you will continue to stand with us. Working together, we can make sure everyone has access to food. To do less is unacceptable. Franklin D. Roosevelt stated: "The test of our progress is not whether we add more to the abundance of those who have much, it is whether we provide enough for those who have too little."




Sources of Revenue

How We Fight Hunger: Our Programs and Services

DIRECT SERVICES PROGRAM: Operated through our Albemarle Food Pantry, the program serves individuals in our immediate area, including Elizabeth City, Pasquotank and Camden Counties, with food, advocacy and referrals to additional emergency service providers as necessary.

Service Results: 6,289 households served with a total of 13,493 individuals 502,635 lbs of food, equivalent to 418,862 meals provided

MOBILE FOOD PANTRY PROGRAM: The program has been incredibly successful in increasing our service to areas where access to a fixed facility is limited or otherwise has a barrier to food assistance. Nearly 24% of the households served by the Food Bank receive service through this program.

Service Results: 216 deployments in 13 counties Average of 116 households served at each deployment 883,836 lbs of food, equivalent to 736,530 meals provided

DISASTER RELIEF PROGRAMS: These programs help bring emergency food and grocery items to victims of disaster. The Food Bank acts as a staging area for supplies like water and ready-to-eat meals. By coordinating with local emergency management groups and the Red Cross we can distribute these supplies to affected areas. In recent years these efforts have been called upon in the wake of Superstorm Sandy, Hurricane Irene, and the tornadoes in Bertie County.

SNACK PROGRAM: We continue to work with nine After School Programs, including all seven of the Elizabeth City-Pasquotank County elementary schools. The program succeeds in getting food into the hands of hungry children in Pasquotank County.

Service Results: 9 after school programs More than 200 children enrolled every school day More than 25,500 snacks provided

BACKPACK PROGRAM: We have partnered with agencies across northeast North Carolina to provide hungry children with much needed, nutritious food items on the weekend during the school year. Many children participate in free and reduced food programs through school systems, however, these programs only operate Monday-Friday. Backpack programs are able to provide two breakfasts and two lunches to help children return to school

on Monday morning ready to learn. This program continues to see growth and we have added 5 programs in 2013-2014.

Service Results: 5 participating programs Over 500 children served every weekend More than 50,000 meals provided

FOOD RESCUE PROGRAM: This program allows us to pick up prepared and perishable foods from retailers and restaurants then give it to local agencies for distribution to their clients. The largest source of these items comes from retail donations through our partnerships with Food Lion, Walmart and Farm Fresh. Beginning in November of 2012, we have instituted Saturday and Sunday pick-up from retailers in Elizabeth City. This adjustment to the program will translate into an additional 120,000 pounds of food coming in to feed hungry families.


Service Results: 40 retail partners in 14 counties 1,750,000 lbs of food rescued, equivalent to 1,450,000 meals

USDA TEFAP PROGRAM (The Emergency Food Assistance Program): This program enables hunger relief agencies to provide healthy, nutritious food to hungry families. The USDA buys and ships food to states, which, in turn, distribute it to food banks. We then provide the food to agencies to distribute at the local level. The FBA holds the contract for 13 of our 15 assigned counties. This program specifically targets low-income families and individuals with an income of 200% of the poverty level and below. In the last fiscal year, we experienced significant declines in the commodity food allotted to the program that occurred with the end of stimulus funding for TEFAP.

Service Results: 966,564 lbs of food distributed, equivalent to 805,470 meals Accounted for 18.93% of our distributed food

SNAP PROGRAM (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program): This program is a second means for hunger relief agencies to provide healthy, nutritious food products to needy families. The NC General Assembly appropriates funds for the Feeding America Food Banks to purchase food to augment the nutritional food needs for our hunger relief partners. FY 2011/12 saw an abnormally large, one-time appropriation of funds for the program. The current fiscal year has seen a precipitous decline in this funding.



Hunger In America Study 2014

The Hunger in America study has been conducted every five years by Feeding America (formerly America's Second Harvest) since 1993. The results of this study will be available to us in May 2014 and will provide us with an in-depth look at who is in need, how the need is met, and by whom.

Data collection for Hunger in America 2014 (HIA 2014) was completed on August 30th, 2013. Nearly 200 food banks in the Feeding America network participated in the survey. This two part survey consists of an Agency Survey completed by our hunger relief partners and a Client Survey completed by those seeking assistance. HIA 2014 marked several firsts for the study. The study employed the extensive use of technology in an effort to facilitate data collection. The agency portion of the survey was available to all program types. The survey was completed using a touch screen tablet with questions read aloud through headphones for increased client privacy.



Almost 34,000 agencies across the Feeding America network provided information about their programs and operations in the Agency Survey

and nearly 64,000 clients participated in the Client Survey. The Food Bank of the Albemarle visited 48 programs throughout our 15 county area, surveying 265 clients.

In FY 12/13, **23 local farms and farm markets** donated fresh produce in addition to numerous individuals contributing surplus food from their gardens.




